#### Working to prevent drowning and reduce water-related injury.

The Lifesaving Society is a full-service provider of programs, products and services designed to prevent drowning. We save lives and prevent water-related injury through our training programs, Water Smart<sup>®</sup> public education, drowning research, aquatic safety management and lifesaving sport.

We are a national volunteer organization and registered charity composed of ten provincial/ territorial branches, tens of thousands of individual members, and over 4,000 affiliated swimming pools, waterfronts, schools and clubs.

The Lifesaving Society is a leader and partner in the delivery of water safety education throughout Canada and around the world. (The Society operates globally in over 25 countries.) We represent Canada in the Commonwealth Royal Life Saving Society and we are Canada's Full Member in the International Life Saving Federation. The Lifesaving Society takes lead responsibility for drowning prevention in Canada.

We have been teaching swimming, water safety and water rescue in Canada since 1896.

# Teaching Canadians to save themselves and rescue others

Annually, over 1.2 million Canadians participate in our swimming, lifesaving, lifeguard, first aid and leadership programs. As Canada's lifeguarding experts, we set the standard for lifeguard training and certify Canada's National Lifeguards.

#### Making Canadians Water Smart

The Society focuses its public education efforts on people most at risk or on those who can make a significant difference. Our Swim to Survive<sup>®</sup> program provides the skills to survive an unexpected fall into deep water.

#### **Drowning research**

The Society conducts research into drowning, aquatic injury and rescue interventions to support the Society's training programs and drowning prevention education.

#### Setting the standard

The Society establishes aquatic safety standards and consults on aquatic safety issues for the aquatic industry, governments and the judiciary.

#### Lifesaving sport

The Society is the Canadian governing body for lifesaving sport – a sport recognized by the International Olympic Committee and the Commonwealth Games Federation. Our Lifesaving Sport Fundamentals program offers a recreational introduction to lifesaving sport skills. Age-group, senior and masters athletes compete provincially, nationally and internationally.

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Organizations, like people, must determine the spirit they adopt when they face adversity. As lifeguards, we know to meet adversity with action. In March, as New Brunswick implemented measures to slow the spread of COVID-19, the Society jumped into action. Immediate precautions were implemented to ensure a safe work environment for staff, and a course of action was plotted to navigate through the months ahead. As a result, in a year where the world experienced upheaval, the Society achieved results that will serve us well for years to come.

The hosting of the Society's May AGM in a virtual environment was one such example of innovative action. Not simply that we adopted the new technology of the day, but in the detailed effort of leveraging

that technology to its maximum. The outcome was significant – a professional event that was well attended and well received. More importantly, the investment in staff training and software for the AGM was integrated into daily operations adding one more tool to our tool belt.

The innovations continued with the unprecedented supports provided for our affiliates. Namely, the currency period of vocational awards was extended for those whose certifications would have otherwise expired, allowing pools and waterfronts to focus on their reopening plans. In July, the Society published the bilingual Guide to Reopening Pools and Waterfronts and made it available for free to all affiliates of the Lifesaving Society.

Covid's unpredictable nature meant each week brought with it new pandemicrelated challenges requiring our daily attention. Nevertheless, projects crucial to the Society's success were kept on track: new policies were introduced, new books were published, and, in December, we launched the revised Bronze medal awards with a suite of support resources.

> The Society's Board of Directors also persevered in its continuous effort towards responsible governance. The Board believes in the benefits of diversity. We recognize that diversity of thought makes prudent business sense and that there is a significant relationship between diversity of gender in leadership positions, and organizational performance. Correspondingly, in November, the Board adopted policies that will

recruit new men and women to our Board and Activity Centre Councils with diverse skills, experience, and background that better reflect our membership

Of course, our efforts would be blunted without adequate resources. Many of our achievements in 2020 were made possible by the timely and robust financial support provided by the **Government of** Canada and the Government of New **Brunswick**. We are immensely thankful for their support.

I also express many thanks to my fellow Board members, our affiliates, our volunteers, and our professional staff - including **Angela Johnson** and **Luc** Sonier who stepped down from their roles with the Society in 2020. Together, our hard work turned a year of adversity into a year of achievement. It is has been an honour and a privilege to serve as President of the Lifesaving Society New Brunswick. I'm confident that our future is bright.

## FINANCIAL REPORT

The summary financial information presented here is derived from the Royal Life Saving Society New Brunswick Branch Inc. audited financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2020. The Lifesaving Society New Brunswick is a provincially incorporated entity and registered charity. Detailed audited financial statements are available upon request.

The Society generated a surplus of \$46,000 in 2020 compared to a deficit of \$14,000 the previous year. Total revenues increased by \$17,000 (7%) to \$276,000 while total expenditures decreased \$43,000 (16%) to \$230,000.

The increase to the Society's revenue came predominantly from government grants, which increased by \$71,000 (297%) in 2020, attributed to the Canadian Emergency Wage Subsidy and the Government of New Brunswick through the Regional Development Fund. These programs were created to support businesses significantly impacted by COVID-19 and are not a sustainable revenue source.

The Society's traditional revenue streams decreased substantially over the prior year. Training program revenue fell \$20,000 (36%) and literature revenues dropped \$11,000 (31%) due primarily to the spring lockdown requiring all aquatic facilities to close. Core programs such as Bronze and First aid fell 32% while National Lifeguard decreased 15% over the prior year.

With the Society's core revenue streams predictably diminished by Covid, early decisions were made to limit spending. As a result, total expenditures decreased by \$43,000 (16%) to \$230,000. The savings came predominantly in salaries and administration from the three-month vacancy of the Training Program Manager and savings in utilities, postage and office supplies consistent with the temporary office closure in the spring. Meeting and travel expenses decreased over \$17,000 (80%) due to meetings, including the AGM, being hosted by videoconference and travel being largely prohibited. Additionally, we recovered previously written off bad debt of \$7,500 linked to the 2018 closure of St. Patrick's Family Centre.

Despite the challenges of the past year and the ones that lie ahead, the Society is well positioned and has the resources to continue to invest in technology to meet new program delivery demands and to maximize affiliate services as we work together to prevent drowning in New Brunswick.






## TRAINING PROGRAMS

Training Programs contributes to the mission of the Society by teaching Canadians the skills and the knowledge they need to enjoy water safely and to save themselves and rescue others in an emergency. The Society's National Lifeguard certification is the standard for professional lifeguards in Canada.

Despite a year of constrained aquatic programing, 2020 was rife with accomplishments. We supported aquatic operators with resources to keep their pools running safely. We published the new *Instructor Manual*. We launched the highly anticipated revised Bronze medal awards and we continued to welcome new affiliates to our Swim for Life program.





#### **Bronze revisions**

In December, the Society launched the revised Bronze medal awards with improved program progressions and more focused curriculums. Bronze Star zeroes in on swimming proficiency and fitness; Bronze Medallion brings back swimming strokes; Bronze Cross now contains the fundamental lifeguarding skills and concepts needed to prepare deck and beach-ready Assistant Lifeguards.

To support the updated curriculum, new resources were developed including the new *Bronze Medals Award Guide*, Bronze Medallion and Cross candidate workbooks, new test sheets, a standardized recertification process, and an online update pathway to get Lifesaving Instructors, Examiners and Trainers up to speed.

#### **Policy changes**

Over the course of 2020 and following consultation with the Society's affiliate members, leadership personnel and aquatic industry leaders, the Society made several changes to program policies.

In February, the Society adopted a 3-year period for the validity of its Emergency First Aid and Workplace Standard First Aid certifications in the interests of reducing confusion among employers and harmonizing the Lifesaving Society currency period with New Brunswick government regulations, CSA recommendations and the general practice among other workplace first aid providers.

In July, the Lifesaving Society Canada adopted 15 years as the minimum age prerequisite for certification as a Swim Instructor, Lifesaving Instructor, or National Lifeguard. The change was a first step in addressing chronic staff shortages throughout the aquatics industry – particularly for seasonal affiliates who rely on pre-summer training for seasonal staff.

Also in July, the Society broadened access to its Bronze Cross and National Lifeguard courses by accepting, for prerequisite purposes, Workplace Standard First Aid certifications provided by all training agencies approved by the Government of New Brunswick.



#### Safety standards

Following the advice and best practices of Public Health, the Lifesaving Society New Brunswick, with partners across the aquatics industry, published a series of guidelines, recommendations, and information bulletins to help affiliates continue to serve their communities while keeping patrons and staff safe through the Covid-19 pandemic.

The Society published its New Brunswick *Guide for Reopening Pools and Waterfronts* in English and French, and made it available in July to all members of the Society free of charge.

#### **Drowning report**

The Society published 2020 editions of the Canadian and Maritime drowning reports prepared by the Drowning Prevention Research Centre Canada. The most recent data showed a small increase in the number drowning fatalities in the Maritimes but the contributing factors remain the same. Not wearing a lifejacket or PFD is still the single largest factor and males continue to account for nearly 9 out of 10 drowning deaths.

The Society has been researching and reporting on water-related deaths in Canada for over 30 years. The Society uses the drowning data to ensure its training programs and public education activities are properly focused and guided by a comprehensive fact base.





## MEMBER SERVICES

Member Services develops and maintains the corporate functions, systems and infrastructure required to support and service the membership of the Society.

#### Governance

The National Society (Lifesaving Society Canada) is governed by a Board of Directors nominated by Branches and elected by the members at the Society's AGM. National commissions are led by volunteer commissioners. These commissions are: Public Education, Training Programs, Lifesaving Sport, Aquatic Safety Standards and International Relations. A management team is comprised of senior staff of the 10 provincial/territorial Branches.

### New Brunswick Board of Directors

A volunteer Board of Directors governs the Lifesaving Society New Brunswick in accordance with its mission and bylaws. Directors are elected for a two-year term by the Society's membership at the annual general meeting. No person or body external to the Society is entitled to appoint any directors.

In August, after years of diligent service, **Luc Sonier**, Vice President Member Services, stepped down from the Society's Board of Directors.

#### Activity centre councils

Activity centre councils are composed of chairs, appointed by the Board of Directors for a two-year term, who oversee specific portfolios necessary to manage the work of the activity centres. Chairs recruit and develop committee members. A vice president, or another individual appointed by the Board of Directors, chairs each activity centre council.

In February, the Training Program Council welcomed **Nancy Perry** and **Alex Mullin** as the Swim Program Chair and National Lifeguard Chair, respectively. In October, **Grégoire Cormier** stepped down from his position as Technical Chair on the Lifesaving Sport Council to join the Society's professional full-time staff.

#### Annual meeting

The Lifesaving Society New Brunswick convened its inaugural video conference AGM May 14, 2020. We acknowledge the contributions of the following volunteers who made the event a success: Luc Sonier, David Shea, Gabrielle Léger, Samantha Kuhn, Nikita Spencer, Nancy Perry, Alex Mullin, Joey Doucet, Mikaël Doucet, Marcel McLaughlin and Peter Mahony.

#### Commonwealth honours

Sadly, due to restrictions on public gatherings, and to safeguard the health and wellbeing of our volunteers and staff, no Commonwealth Honours were presented in 2020.

We thank the **Honourable Brenda Murphy**, Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, for graciously accepting our request to become our Honorary Patron, and for Her Honour's letter congratulating the Society's tireless volunteers for their continued success.
